Section 2.08 Compensation of Mayor and Council Members.

(1) The Mayor shall receive as monetary compensation the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) per month, and each Council Member shall receive as monetary compensation the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700) per month. Both amounts shall be adjusted annually according to the consumer price index (CPI) for the Denver-Boulder-Greeley area, or such successor index promulgated by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. The first CPI adjustment shall be applied January 1, 2025. In addition, the Mayor and Council Members shall receive such other non-monetary compensation or benefits as may be set by ordinance. Monetary compensation shall not be modified by ordinance.
